Number Your Days!

Psalm 90:12 - So **teach us** to **number our days**, that we may **gain a heart of wisdom**.

Understanding the brevity of life is an open door to gaining a heart of wisdom.

Numbering your days will provide a clarity or purpose and fearlessness in life that nothing else can.

Wisdom - the ways and purposes of God

- Wisdom is the capacity to make decisions today that don't bring regret in the future.
- If we approach the brevity of life without an eternal perspective, it will drive us toward hopelessness and unwise choices.

Ecclesiastes 2:1-11 -

- 1 I thought in my heart, "Come now, I will test you with pleasure to find out what is good." But that also proved to be meaningless.
- 2 "Laughter," I said, "is foolish. And what does pleasure accomplish?"
- 3 I tried cheering myself with wine, and embracing folly—my mind still guiding me with wisdom. I wanted to see what was worthwhile for men to do under heaven during the few days of their lives.
- 4 I undertook great projects: I built houses for myself and planted vineyards.
- 5 I made gardens and parks and planted all kinds of fruit trees in them.
 - 6 I made reservoirs to water groves of flourishing trees.
- 7 I bought male and female slaves and had other slaves who were born in my house. I also owned more herds and flocks than anyone in Jerusalem before me.
- 8 I amassed silver and gold for myself, and the treasure of kings and provinces. I acquired men and women singers, and a harem as well-the delights of the heart of man.

- 9 I became greater by far than anyone in Jerusalem before me. In all this my wisdom stayed with me.
- 10 *I denied myself nothing my eyes desired*; *I refused my heart no pleasure*. My heart took delight in all my work, and this was the reward for all my labor.
- 11 Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done and what I had toiled to achieve, **everything was meaningless**, a chasing after the wind; **nothing was gained** under the sun.

Abraham - Isaac & Esau?

Genesis 25:29-34 –

- 29 Once when Jacob was cooking some stew, Esau came in from the open country, famished.
- 30 He said to Jacob, "Quick, let me have some of that red stew! I'm famished!"
 - 31 Jacob replied, "First sell me your birthright."
- 32 "Look, I am about to die," Esau said. "What good is the birthright to me?"
- 33 But Jacob said, "Swear to me first." So he swore an oath to him, selling his birthright to Jacob.
- 34 Then Jacob gave Esau some bread and some lentil stew. He ate and drank, and then got up and left. So Esau **despised his birthright**.

<u>Hebrews 12:16-17</u> – *THE MESSAGE* - Watch out for the Esau syndrome: trading away God's lifelong gift in order to satisfy a short-term appetite. You well know how Esau

later regretted that impulsive act and wanted God's blessing—but by then it was too late, tears or no tears.

Esau Syndrome – Trading away God's lifelong gift in order to satisfy a short-term appetite.

Hebrews 11:24-27 -

- 24 By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter.
- 25 He chose to be mistreated along with the people of God rather than to enjoy the pleasures of sin **for a season**.
- 26 He regarded disgrace for the sake of Christ as of greater value than the treasures of Egypt, because he was looking ahead to his reward.
