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Financial Support of Paul's Ministry and Mission

<u>I</u> Corinthians 9:11-12 – 11 If we have sown spiritual seed among you, is it too much if we reap a material harvest from you? 12 If others have this right of support from you, shouldn't we have it all the more?

<u>I Corinthians 9:15-27</u> - But I have not used any of these rights (getting financial support from them). And I am not writing this in the hope that you will do such things for me. I would rather die than have anyone deprive me of this boast.

Paul's Mission and Values

I Corinthians 9:16-27 – 16 Yet when I preach the gospel, I cannot boast, for I am compelled to preach. Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel! 17 If I preach voluntarily, I have a reward; if not voluntarily, I am simply discharging the trust committed to me. **18** What then is my reward? Just this: that in preaching the gospel I may offer it free of charge, and so not make use of my rights in preaching it. 19 Though I am free and belong to no man, I make myself a slave to everyone, to win as many as possible. 20 To the Jews I became like a Jew, to win the Jews. To those under the law I became like one under the law (though I myself am not under the law), so as to win those under the law. 21 To those not having the law I became like one not having the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law), so as to win those not having the law. 22 To the weak I became weak, to win the weak. I have become all things to all men so that by all possible means I might save some. 23 I do all this for the sake of the gospel, that I may share in its blessings. 24 Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. 25 Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last forever. 26 Therefore I do not run like a man running aimlessly: I do not fight like a man beating the air. 27 No. I beat my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize.

<u>I Corinthians 10:23-24</u> – 23 "Everything is permissible," but not everything is beneficial. "Everything is permissible," but not everything is constructive. 24 Nobody should seek his own good, but the good of others.

<u>I Corinthians 10:33</u> - Even as I try to please everybody in every way. For I am not seeking my own good but the good of many, so that they may be saved.

<u>I</u> Corinthians 11:1-33 - Paul gives instructions on issues regarding husbands and wives and cultural context (women's heads uncovered)

I Corinthians 11:20-34 - Paul gives instructions on communion

<u>I</u> Corinthians 11:23-25</u> - For I received from the Lord what I also passed on to you: The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, 24 and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me."

I Corinthians 12:1-11 – Teaching on Spiritual Gifts

I Corinthians 12:1 - Now about spiritual gifts, brothers, I do not want you to be ignorant

I Corinthians 12:12-30 – The Diversity of the Body of Christ

<u>I</u> Corinthians 12:18-20 – 18 But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. 19 If they were all one part, where would the body be? 20 As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

I Corinthians 13:1-13 – Paul's teaching about God's love

<u>I</u> Corinthians 13:4-8</u> - 4 Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. **5** It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. **6** Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. **7** It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. **8** Love never fails.

<u>I Corinthians 14:1-40</u> – Setting order in the church regarding the operation of spiritual gifts and tongues.

• Paul explains the difference between the gift of "Diverse kinds of tongues" that is to be used in public worship and the private and devotional use of tongues.

<u>I</u> Corinthians 14:4-5</u> – 4 He who speaks in a tongue edifies himself, but he who prophesies edifies the church. **5** I would like every one of you to speak in tongues, but I would rather have you prophesy. He who prophesies is greater than one who speaks in tongues, unless he interprets, so that the church may be edified.

<u>I</u> Corinthians 14:18-19 – 18 I thank God that I speak in tongues more than all of you. 19 But in the church I would rather speak five intelligible words to instruct others than ten thousand words in a tongue.

<u>I Corinthians 14:40</u> - But everything should be done in a fitting and orderly way.

I Corinthians 15:1-58 – The Resurrection

<u>I</u> Corinthians 15:12-14</u> – 12 But if it is preached that Christ has been raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? 13 If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. 14 And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith.

<u>I</u> Corinthians 15:42-44</u> – 42 So will it be with the resurrection of the dead. The body that is sown is perishable, it is raised imperishable; 43 it is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory; it is sown in weakness, it is raised in power; 44 it is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body.

<u>I</u> Corinthians 15:54-55 – 54 When the perishable has been clothed with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality, then the saying that is written will come true: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." 55 "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?"
